Peter the leader, Peter the strong, and Peter the weak, Peter who betrayed Jesus and yet loved Him. His mercy extended to him by allowing him to make amends and restate to Jesus three times that he loved him and giving him back his authority to lead and be the Shepherd which he himself was. Recently speaking to some children about the Resurrection I found that some found it difficult to grasp that Jesus was alive and not dead. They were very upset about the fact that Jesus died in such a

> cruel way but the fact He rose stunned them especially in the sense of the fact that the tomb was empty... I wonder how many of us feel this same sense of disbelief. We accept that He died but His continuing life leaves us rather

perplexed as to what that really means and that we too will rise and live on. We then realise that we pray to Him but what does that therefore mean as far as 'the rising.' I am sure that many of us leapfrog this dilemma, accept it in faith but leave it alone. It is quite sad that this happens for his rising is the essential critical part of the whole story... He returned to His Father and opened up the gates of heaven for us. He was no ghost or spirit but a tangible human and divine being.

The mercy of the Father is seen in this amazing event. The Father who so loved the world sent His Son to bring us back to himself through the <u>Death</u> and <u>Rising</u> of His Son. Had He just died it would have been the end. Sad, maybe incredible, yes, even a self-offering, but not complete.

It is here therefore that we find the purpose of His Resurrection. We see the completeness of the Gift that the Father and Spirit gave us on the Easter Day. Jesus lives and therefore we can pay to Him and speak with Him.

We can be grateful and speak to the Father and ask for the Spirit's guidance.

When we speak of God's mercy this is what we must recall. The Father could have abandoned us to a death. He could have left us without any aid or help. He could have closed the gates of Paradise. But instead He kept His promise and freed us to live with Him. Does He not show incredible mercy to us? In Jesus we see that extension of His love. In everything that Jesus did His compassion and kindness His helping hand, His understanding and love reveals God's Mercy. But is it not thus imperative that as well as rejoicing and singing loud praises we also carry out His Mission, which is to tell all people of His Mercy and the Good News of Salvation.
